Commitment to Nebraska's Veterans for 134 Years! -Nancy Klimek, Activity Manager

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Salute

The Nebraska Veterans' Home was established on *March 4, 1887* when the *Legislative Bill 247* passed to create the state's first "*Soldiers and Sailors Home*". In the bill, it referenced the fact that there were many old soldiers in Nebraska, who from wounds or disabilities received while in the *Union Army* during the rebellion, were in the county poorhouses in the state. It resolved that a suitable building be erected and grounds provided for the *care and comfort of the old soldiers of Nebraska* in their declining years.



This month, we will be observing our *134th anniversary* of providing for that care and comfort to the thousands of individuals who have resided

in this Nebraska Veterans' Home system, at what *now includes four campuses* across the state! Over the 134 year history of the Nebraska Veterans' Home, many challenges have been faced, and yet the *commitment of Nebraska's citizens to our state's veterans* has never wavered!

As we reach this annual observance of the Veterans Home's beginnings, we reflect on the tremendous challenges our teammates and members have encountered this past year, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. This has not been the first time in our Veterans Home history that we experienced a Pandemic. In 1918, a new deadly strain of influenza (called the **Spanish Flu**) hit the United States, which eventually killed approximately 675,000 in our country alone (over 50 million world wide). The Nebraska "Soldiers and Sailors Home" suffered many casualties in that Pandemic, due to the limited medical knowledge available and the infectious nature of the flu. In the U.S., we have now reached the tragic total of 500,000 Americans that have now died from the COVID-19 virus, which is fast approaching the number of casualties from the Spanish Flu in 1918.

Although we mourn the loss of each individual that has succumbed to the COVID-19 virus (the current total of 500,000 is more Americans who have died in a single year of this pandemic than who died in World War I, World War II, and the Vietnam War combined), we look to the year ahead with hope. The Central Nebras-ka Veterans' Home has completed three vaccination clinics, with over 95% of the members and over 77% of the staff opting to receive their vaccine. This is a huge step towards minimizing the risk of the virus coming into the facility, which will also hopefully allow us to eventually move into the next phase for long term care facilities.

As we head into this 134th year of providing care and services to our members, we look forward to *making the transition* to the other side of the Pandemic. Members will have the ongoing opportunity to be engaged in *fun and meaningful activities*, throughout each phase.



In March, the activities planned thus far include the celebration of the patent for the delicious candy of *M & M's*, programs and bus

tours pertaining to the great *Sandhill Crane* migration, the added treat of Nebraska's famous "*Runzas*" at a lunch meal, a *St. Patricks*' *Day* celebration, observing horse racing season by playing and winning prizes on our *horse race DVD game*, and *Easter* festivities. In addition, members can participate in therapeutic craft and woodshop sessions, and pursue their individual leisure pursuits in the library, canteen, dens, activity rooms, and outside strolls as the weather starts to warm.

When the March 2020 edition of the newsletter was published, we had no idea how much the world was going to change! But one thing never changes, and that is our *134 year long commitment* to the care and well-being of our State's veterans!





Valentines for Veterans!










A local florist donated buckets of beautiful flowers to arrange in vases to put on display in the various Neighborhoods for the members' enjoyment.
