MONARCH BUTTERFLY

The large and brilliantly-colored monarch butterfly is among the most easily recognizable of the butterfly species that call North America home. They have two sets of wings and a wingspan of three to four inches. Their wings are a deep orange with black borders and veins, and white spots along the edges.

The underside of the wings is pale orange. Male monarchs have two black spots in the center of their hind wings, which females lack. These spots are scent glands that help males attract female mates. Females have thicker wing veins than males. The butterfly's body is black with white markings. From September into early October, fall southern migration to Mexico begins, with the majority of monarchs following the reverse path south along the central migratory corridor which includes Eastern Nebraska. Milkweed is one of their favorite foods. Our gardens have numerous plants that they like to lay their eggs on and feast on. Enjoy them as they travel through in the coming weeks.


