

> that particular day, the storm forced them to work remotely from their hotel rooms!



Protecting Your Information: Be Alert to Prying Phone Calls

There was recently an instance where a CNVH office received a scam call from an individual claiming to be from the Center for Medicare and Medicaid. It was evident they believed the phone number belonged to one of our members.

The caller presented that the reason for his phone call was to inform that our Medicare card was about to expire. The caller then read off a phony address they were planning to mail the replacement card to. By invoking the fear of a one's Medicare benefits "expiring," and the solution, the new card, being mailed to an incorrect address, their next step was likely to coax the call recipient to divulge all kinds of personal information, including but not limited to their real address, date of birth, social security numbers, or more.

Please be aware of phone calls like this as scammers look for vulnerable individuals who are more than eager to divulge information over the phone to someone who is claiming to have a legitimate cause.

As many of us know, but it helps to be reminded on occasion, a legitimate representative working with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, or any Federal government agency will not call our members to ask them for sensitive information.

If you or someone you know receives such a call and are asked for birth dates, social security numbers, Medicaid numbers, or any other sensitive health or financial information, this is a sign that you may be at risk for falling prey to this style of fraud which is a form of elder abuse.

If you ever have concerns about a call or inquiry you've received please let your Social Worker know. We want to keep you and your information safe!

The Wood Shop Process

Today we will be discussing what the Wood Shop process looks like when you come down to Crafts.

When you first arrive our wood shop expert Josh will be working with you. He will help you go through our various books to help you pick out the item you would like to make.

Once you have decided on the item then it is time to pick out the wood. We have several to pick from including Maple, Select Pine, Aspen, Oak, Black Walnut, and Cedar.

At this point if you feel confident in running the tools you could chose to take the safety test and work your way through those so you can help shape your own wood. The vast majority of members don't do this because they choose to allow Josh to cut out the pieces they need to make their project. He does an excellent job!

Once you have your pieces you will begin sanding them until they are smooth. Then you will help or receive assistance glueing or nailing your project together. Once it is put together it may need another round of sanding to get the joints between the pieces smooth and looking good.

Once the piece is sanded to a fine finish you will start selecting the paint or stain you want on your project. You will then put two or three coats of paint or stain on your project until it looks great.

Once your product is completed you have the choice to take it back to your room and display it. Another option would be to take the item and give it away to family or friends as a gift. A


Road Trip! Viewing Sandhill Cranes
