Member of the Month: Gary "Doc" Halbmaier








Fishing Fun!




Members enjoy going out to the lake and fishing. Fishing is one of the members' favorite things to do during the beautiful weather!









Music is good for our souls..



The "White Table" display was placed on exhibit in the Hearth Room for the week leading up to Memorial Day and through the holiday, to pay tribute to those who have given the ultimate sacrifice to our Nation and our freedom.









The table is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner, alone against his or her suppressors, and to show our everlasting concern for our armed forces personnel still missing. It is also reserved in honor of our fallen comrades.

The tablecloth is white, symbolizing the purity of their motives when answering the call to duty.

The single rose in the vase, reminds of the lost or missing service members.

The red ribbon on the vase represents the blood of those that have died in service to our country and also our continued determination to account for our missing.

A slice of lemon on the plate reminds us of the bitter fate of those captured and missing in a foreign land or of the bitter news a family receives when a loved one has been killed in action.

The salt sprinkled on the plate reminds of the countless fallen tears of families who grieve the loss of their loved one Killed in Action or who's loved one has been declared Missing in Action.

The Bible represents faith in a higher power and the pledge to our country, founded as one nation under God.

The glass is inverted to symbolize their inability to share this evening's toast.

The black napkin stands for the emptiness these warriors have left in the hearts of their families and friends.

The candle is reminiscent of the light of hope, which lives in our hearts. It illuminates the path of the fallen soldier on his way to report to the Final Roll Call under the Supreme Commander. It also illuminates the way home for those that are missing.

The chair is empty to symbolize their absence and the empty place it has left in our hearts.

The American Flag reminds us that they have paid the supreme sacrifice to ensure our freedom.
